MEETING SUMMARY

Purpose: Public Open House Meeting #1

Overview	The Town of Tusten has undertaken an effort to develop a Town-wide Natural Resources Inventory (NRI), Open Space and Recreation Plan. The NRI will identify key environmental and open space resources within the Town including wetlands, wildlife habitats, floodzones, forests and more. The Open Space and Recreation Plan will build upon the NRI and establish a vision for a Town-wide network of open spaces. On Thursday, August 1, 2024, the first public open house for the Town of Tusten Natural Resources Inventory, Open Space and Recreation Plan was held. The event took place at the Tusten Town Hall from 7:00 – 8:30 PM. A total of 24 community members attended the Public Open House. A brief presentation was held at the beginning of the public open house providing attendees with a brief overview of the project, public engagement opportunities, and the station boards. The open house format allowed participants to informally walk through seven (7) activity stations at their own pace and provide their input and ideas. A Participant Guide was provided to attendees to guide them through various stations. The activity stations included: • Station #1 – Project Overview • Station #2 – Natural Resource Mapping • Station #3 – Open Space Vision and Values • Station #6 – Community Vision Survey • Station #7 – Kids Table

Additionally, participants had the opportunity to speak with CAC members and the Project Team and also, share written ideas and/or comments on comment cards.

A brief Q and A was held after the presentation. Below is an overview of the discussions had:

- This plan to be used as a guide for the development of the Boy Scout's Land
- The role of the consultant team in the development of the plan
- The next steps in the process would be to draft the Natural Resource Inventory and kick off the Open Space Plan
- How is open space defined and what it means

Station #1: Project Overview

This station provided information about the Natural Resources Inventory, Open Space and Recreation Plan. This station provided context about the purpose of a Natural Resources Inventory, Open Space and Recreation Plan and the roles of the consultant team and the Conservation Advisory Council (CAC). This station provided highlights of existing conditions and natural resources within the Town.

Nine (9) maps were displayed at this station:

- Base Map
- Topography & Steep Slopes
- Existing Land Use
- Existing Zoning
- Known Wetlands
- Flood Hazard Areas
- Delaware Riverbank & Hydrology
- Parks, Recreation & Open Space
- Habitats Biodiversity & Ecological Communities

The Base Map depicted the boundary of the Town of Tusten, showing state, county, and local routes as well as waterbodies.

The Topography & Steep Slopes Map depicts areas within the town that have slopes greater than 15%. 27.5% of land area within the Town has slopes greater than 15%.

The Existing Land Use Map depicts different land uses throughout the Town.

Station #2: Natural Resource Mapping

The Existing Zoning Map depicts the current zoning of all parcels within the Town, using different colors to indicate different zoning districts.

The Known Wetlands Map depicts the NWI Federal Wetlands and NYSDEC Wetlands located within the Town. 7.9% of the total land area in the Town is federal wetlands. 3.7% is NYSDEC Wetlands.

The Flood Hazard Areas Map depicts FEMA Flood Hazard Zones. 5.2% of the land in the Town is in a flood area.

The Delaware Riverbank & Hydrology Map depicts DEC streams and lakes as well as Recreational and Scenic River Areas within the Town.

The Parks, Recreation & Open Space Map depicts parks, private forest land, camping, and BSA land within the Town.

The Habitats, Biodiversity & Ecological Communities Map depicts state-regulated freshwater wetlands, significant natural communities, rare plants and animals, and important areas.

This station asked participants to share their thoughts about their open space and natural resource values.

Common themes included:

- Ensuring clean water and air quality
- Protection and preservation of open spaces, wildlife habitats and ecosystems
- Avoid development in flood zones and respecting wetlands and animal habitats
- Providing recreational opportunities

Station #3: Open Space Vision and Values

Station #4: Recreation Station

This station allowed participants to share their thoughts about current and future public recreation within the Town. Participants were asked to identify on a map and board where they go for recreation and what types of recreation they participate in.

- Waterfront and water-based recreation
- Utilizing lands such as Boy Scout property for recreation and naturebased activities

The following highlights areas in the Town that were most identified as places for recreation:

- Narrowsburg
- Tusten
- Near waterbodies such as Rock Lake, Daris Pond, Clarks Pond, Turnpike Pond
- A comment was also made that a timber rattlesnake den was located near Trout Pond Road
